Karen Hill, Manager Visitor Servicing at the Tourist Centre gives us a guide to the week's activities, "We are encouraging all local residents as well as the tourists to take full advantage of what is on display.

Bridgetown itself is special, it being the only Heritage listed town in the south west, so there will be a lot to see and do, plus many a Devonshire tea to try.

Monday to Saturday of the festival the Police Station Museum will be open from 10am to 1pm, with free entry, with stories from early Bridgetown.

Bridgetown History Walks are holding a guided walk each afternoon starting at 11 am. These will be at half price for the week, bookings essential.

The two iconic churches of the town will also be opened, Saint Paul's Anglican Church on the 19th April with viewing from 4pm to view the magnificent sculptural pieces within the church that were created by Bridgetown's master craftsman Gordon Holdsworth, followed by a Gospel Singalong with Mary Myfanwy and Daun Crozier at 5.30pm.

Then on Sunday 23rd April, 10.30am – 11.30am, the Uniting Church will have an Open Morning after their regular Sunday service. This is where you can step inside the oldest surviving church in Bridgetown and a former Methodist Church, constructed of local stone in a Federation Gothic style. Morning tea will be available, all are welcome.

#### Local Doctor recognised with **Health Excellence Award**

Dr William Michael Dewing was recently awarded the WA Rural Health Excellence GP of the Year Award.

The awards were hosted by Rural Health West and WA Country Health Service on Saturday 11th March. The annual WA Rural Health Excellence Awards recognise and acknowledge the vital role health professionals play in WA rural communities.

More than thirty health professionals and health teams were recognised for their incredible achievements and contributions.

Mick Dewing was given the award for his service to the Bridgetown and Blackwood region as a general practitioner (GP) and obstetrician for the past 45 years. Only recently has he stepped down from the roster for after-hours emergency hospital cover and has only recently retired from obstetrics.

Michael and Jenny Dewing moved to Bridgetown with a six-month-old baby in 1978 to start a new life. Mick reflects on how it all came about, "Why we choose Bridgetown was quite serendipitous. While I was working at Princess Margaret Childrens Hospital I started treating a young girl from Bridgetown who had a referral letter from her doctor, a Nigel Jones.

The letter's professionalism and caring manner caught my attention, so I noted the address and later that day I wrote to Nigel asking about a position in Bridgetown. I got a reply the next day, as he was keen for me to join him in Bridgetown.

"Even though it sounds like I acted on a whim, Jenny and I had for a long while been coming to the south west on weekends for bush walks, canoeing and camping, and we both had a desire to live in a rural community.

"Jenny and I, with our four children have all thrived living in the south west. ... Continued page 15

The sculptures Kim has produced over the years have been a mix of different materials, ranging from works in bronze, concrete, resin to remnants from the bush.

Kim has recently finished a sculpture design in concrete of a 'money frog'. This sculpture will be used as an honesty box for when visitors come to view the garden, with the frog being a depository in which they can leave a cash donation after enjoying the sculptures in his Sculpture Garden.

During the Open Studios Art Trail the gardens and studio will be open, with an artist on hand, from 10am till 5pm from 1st to 16th of April.

The garden will then be opened to the public to view as they wish. A solar light system has been set up so the sculptures are lit up at dusk, giving the park a whole different atmosphere.

The sculpture park is continually growing and developing, along with Kim's need to be creative.

...continuing Grace Wilkins recollections of early life in Bridgetown she describes how her mother made bread for their family "she made the bread in a brick oven which was built outside the house. She built a really big fire in the oven, let it go out, cleaned out the ashes, had the bread ready to put in (a dozen loaves at a time) and left in the oven for one hour. I remember it was beautiful bread about three times a week, we were a big family."

Having got the shape of your oven, you have only to continue to build with mud till the whole is covered by a foot of mud.

A piece of old tank or any curved iron placed over the oven and secured there will protect it from rain, etc.

When it has set for two or three days or less in the summer, remove the sand by way of the door and put a slow fire inside; this will burn the box out and harden the inside.

Keep a slow fire in it all day if possible. Your oven will be ready then for your first batch of bread. A piece of iron cut to size of door will serve to keep in the heat.

Interaction with the local Indigenous tribe was part of life for the family.

"Dad used to shear the sheep and take the wool to Bunbury to barter for the provisions. No money changed hands. The captain would take the wool on exchange for provisions. Dad also used to take palm wool and charcoal to Bunbury for the aborigines who camped near our farm and bring back tea, flour and tobacco for them. They used to scrape the wool from the back of the leaves of the palms, then bag it ready to sell."

Grace recalls..." the aborigines used to camp by the river and roam through the bush and help Dad at times. They were quiet and Mother liked them. She said she never felt frightened when she was there on her own. They always cooked their food in the ashes of the fire."

Noting the importance of the Blackwood River to the early settlers ..."In those days everyone settled on the river because of the water. .... Continued page 14

#### Saving Energy, Money and the **Environment** Mike Kave

Renewable energy is a clean and reliable solution that provides abundant energy and reduces pollution and carbon emissions. However, before we begin to make major changes to our energy infrastructure, the first step is to approach energy efficiency on a local and personal level. We can make simple, affordable changes to our habits, homes and businesses that provide environmental benefits while saving money on energy bills.

A Negawatt is a terminology coined by Amory Lovins, an American writer, physicist, and scientist. It is defined as a unit of energy saved as a result of conservation measures such as reducing the use of heat or electricity. An example of this is LED lighting that uses a fraction of the energy and has a lifespan of 50,000 to 100,000 more hours than an incandescent light globe. This also applies to habitual changes.

My family and I have lived off grid for 6 years now and in order to maintain abundant energy supplies overnight, we use timers and automation to run our energy intensive appliances like our dishwasher, washing machine and hot

water system during the day.

When you buy any of these appliances, check that they can be programmed or even better, can be controlled remotely to turn on and off at set times. With old appliances or appliances that don't have this facility, you may be able to control them with a plug-in timer or get an electrician to put a timer in your switchboard. A great solution is to have the ability to control these devices with Smart Home control system software like Home Assistant.

Jim Dixon is the brain behind BET - Bridgetown Energy Transition. He has had over 50 years' experience

in electrical, mechanical and water engineering and is a passionate advocate for Bridgetown and Greenbushes clean energy future. Jim has conducted around 80 appraisals on local properties and has facilitated the installation of over 250Kw of solar panels. He operates using the gift economy and all donations made help to support Transition Bridgetown. Jim spoke to me regarding maximising the use and return on properties with solar.

"Use as much as you can during the day. If you have an existing resistive water heater, fit an element that can be driven by solar with a timer so it doesn't reheat at night. That saves you 30% on your electricity heating costs to start with, which is usually 40-50% of your total power bill. Even if you haven't got solar, install a timer so it doesn't reheat at night, that saves you 15% off your power bill." ... Continued page 14

## Craig's Corner - With Craig Dawson



I was privileged to present, on behalf of Talison Lithium Pty Ltd (Talison, Company), an overview of the Greenbushes Lithium Operation (Site, Mine) and its importance in supporting the global clean energy transition to the Regional Australia Institute Regions Rising Western Australia conference held in Bunbury during March. Fair to say that most attendees at the conference had little idea as to just how important the Mine is. The Mine's output is almost equal to the output of all the other major lithium producers in Western Australia (see Figure below) and clearly demonstrates that Talison is the Leader in Lithium.



The Site had the opportunity to host members of the Talison Board of Directors (Board) and Executive Management Team during March as part of the annual Board meeting calendar. Site personnel were able to provide an overview to the Board on community and safety initiatives implemented during the 2022 year and to outline plans for the 2023 year. ### **Garden Sculptures**

Father and son, Ron and Brad Edwards, have come back to the south west after a long and busy life working in the mining industry which has seen them working around the world.

Their involvement with mining consisted mainly of supplying and building processing plants for tin, tantalite, gold and diamonds.

Whilst working in and around South Africa they formed firstly a friendship then a partnership, with 'Richard' (Taaafi), a talented metal worker who produces garden sculptures of animals using mild steel.

Since their involvement with Richard, importing his sculptures into Australia, Richard's own business has grown and he now employs around thirteen locals from his village. This partnership is generating not only wealth for his community but is fostering skills with metal fabrication within the village.

Ron Edwards talks about this venture, "The metal animal sculptures are very impressive, we have an elephant and rhinoceros which face out from our business on the corner of Roe Street and Bunbury Street, near the Primary school, which always has heads turning.

"The business has now been opened for eight months and we are really happy with its success.

"Richard makes any animal to order, and we have a lot on order; kangaroos, frill neck lizards and emus are very popular. The metal can be left in its raw state with an ever-growing patina or it can sealed.

"The other part of the business is collectables, which we gather from garage sales and farm clearances: it's the stuff some farmers have stored in their sheds over the years, equipment and tools which had become superseded over time but was considered too good to be thrown out and was therefore was stored. These items have now become wonderous and 'must haves' to a whole new generation, and with the demand, some items have become very valuable."

Brad Edwards goes onto explain, "The business is where

Bridgetown Landscaping once was. We have plans to grow and expand the business, the property goes from Bunbury Street right through to Rose Street on the southern side.

"We are currently housing Warren Bus Service buses; plans are underway to make a new parking area near the Rose Street entrance.

"The bus shed will then become a new display area for the collectables.

"The goods we have are a mixture of delightful items for the garden and a growing assortment of Collectables.

"Enamelled cast iron cooking pots, old signs, film



cases, it's a collection which just needs to be seen to be believed.

"We have been growing the business by attending local shows, markets and events like the Blues to showcase our wares

"Setting the business up in Bridgetown gave us a feeling like we were coming home: Ron went to high school in Denmark, I also visited Bridgetown in my youth for experience in a horticultural coarse I was completing and I'd liked living in Bridgetown."

This is a new business venture which can only be good for the town.


The Returned & Services League Boyup Brook Sub-Branch extends an open invitation to everyone to attend the ANZAC Day Commemoration Services on 25th April.

The Transition Towns movement works to support community groups to advance an ecologically regenerative and socially just future by reducing greenhouse gas emissions, building community and finding local solutions to global problems.

Here at Transition Bridgetown, we have just had the privilege of putting this philosophy into action with the Regen Fest Taster held on Sat 25th March at the Ashbil Community Garden. Together with other local groups who advocate regenerative practices, we had a really fabulous time displaying local, sustainable, low emission and low waste practices, presentations and demonstrations.

We used our Wash Trailer for the first time at the Regen Fest to accommodate the low-waste theme. With reusable, washable plates, cups, cutlery and fabric napkins there was absolutely nothing to dispose of other than a few washbowls

of hot biodegradable soapy water.

The Wash Trailer is completely self contained, includes many extras such as trestles, a gazebo, signs, tea towels etc. You name it – it has it! And it will be available to community groups for local events in the very near future. Please email transitionbridgetown 19@gmail.com for further information.

In addition, we had a mini Waste Station operating on the day. With no general waste bins provided, it was stipulated that those attending would need to take any general waste home with them – it worked a treat! The hens and the compost bin had some great vegie and food scraps but very little other items to be recycled.

From a large awareness display of Plastic Pollution through to miniature goats, practical cottage industry workshops, soil health, growing food and firewood, holistic community development and a giant tomato pinata, there was something of interest for everyone! The local fresh gourmet food wrap stall of mainly organic produce was a big hit too.

It really was a fabulous morning! Big thanks to all the representative from the groups who combined to form Blackwood Events for the Earth and coordinated this event. Thanks also to the Bridgetown Hub for support and administration.

Our next Open Space will be on "Holistic Community Development" by Jim Ife. Jim spoke at the Regen Fest and the message is simple and inspiring. We will have the opportunity to discuss how we are going here in our little towns with our holistic approach to development.



Jim also had advice on aging rooftop hot water systems which are nearing the end of their lives. "Put solar on your roof and fit an efficient heat pump instead, you end up paying less money in the first place and you generate your own power to use all the time the sun's shining

"Electricity is never going to get cheaper so if you're going to get a new air conditioner go for something that will cost \$500 more, but uses \$1000 a year less in electricity so it pays for itself in six months easy. I worked with a lady who replaced a 5kW air conditioner with a 600W air conditioner that does the same job."

Well designed and insulated solar passive homes are optimal but we can also make inexpensive retrofits. Installing ceiling and wall insulation, sealing gaps in doors and windows and fitting curtains or blinds with pelmets or external shade blinds can have significant effects on our comfort levels. Well insulated homes also require less energy to heat and cool. Some measures require active management. In summer, opening windows overnight when outside temperatures are lower and closing windows in the morning before it gets hotter is a great method for reducing the use of air conditioning.

Jim uses a laser thermometer to show people the significant differences in temperatures caused by drafts from air vents in homes. "You can get draft excluders, they make a massive difference to your air conditioner load. As the roof space gets hot, the air expands and pushes it down into your house. The same in winter, you get a massive heat loss. If people say they can feel a draft along the floor, I put a tea candle on the floor in a saucer, watch which way the flame is moving and move it around to find the source of the draft. It's really simple, but it just takes that little bit of time. New windows don't have air vents in them because they allow cold air to come inside and run up the window causing condensation. If you're in an older house with vents in the widows, you can use some plasticine to fill them up, it stops the source of draft. It's the same with doors, draft sealing, it's available in all sizes, the amount of difference you can make is amazing."

You had to cart water from the river but later there would be a tank at the house. Washing was a big job for my mother. We had a copper set in the stones in the yard and galvanised iron tubs and she used to scrub the clothes till they were perfectly clean and there were lots of clothes for a big family."



We are following the steps in the Conservation Plan drawn up by a Heritage Architect in 2012. Her work was funded by the Lotterywest Conservation of Cultural Heritage Program, with assistance from the Shire of Bridgetown Greenbushes' Community Grant program, for which we were most grateful. Work was undertaken around the Church in 2014 to drain and stabilise the site (using another Lotterywest grant) prior to commencing the masonry work in 2022.

#### **Repairs to St Paul's Church**

We have the pleasure to live in one of Australia's few Heritage Towns, surrounded by iconic buildings on the municipal register. After 100 years or so those buildings require some TLC. That is the case with St Paul's Church. The original lime mortar is turning to dust and needs cleaning out and replacing. Past efforts to fill gaps between the stones in the walls used cement. This is the wrong material. Cement traps moisture in the walls, potentially causing problems with mould on the inside. Lime mortar has wicking qualities that will expel moisture in the stonework.

Repacking the walls and buttresses with lime mortar is a process with several steps. First, old, crumbling mortar and cement have to be removed. Next the gaps between the stones are filled with lime-rich mortar. In some places this has required injecting mortar into the walls to depths of 15cm or more. Once it has dried the mortar is smoothed. In some places a second coat has been required. The lime naturally turns bright white when it dries

The bright white on the Church walls will be toned down to match patches of the old mortar that have remained in good condition. An old recipe for toning down the mortar was to use a mix of charcoal in milk, however that does not last particularly well. We shall be using a Ferric chloride solution. Once a suitable shade for the mortar has been achieved, tuck pointing will be applied over the top to match as closely as we can the original colours and the original tuck pointing.
