Home Coming

Bridgetown Historical Society

The early development of the Bridgetown Historical Society, (BHS), seems to have been motivated by Major H M Whittell., pictured right.

1948 In April he successfully moved at a Ratepayers meeting of the Bridgetown Roads Board that the Board appoint a small sub-historical committee. Whittell Major further stated that when he was last in Perth, he had copied out from the archives six original



letters written by Surveyor Carey when he was surveying the Bridgetown district. He suggested the board get a copy of the original township plan which was available from the Lands Department.

By December 1948 the small sub-historical committee had progressed to a Historical Committee and Major Whittell had obtained many documents associated with the foundation of Bridgetown and arrangements by the Historical Committee would need to be activated for the filing of historical records.

June 1949 and there was a little progress – The Blackwood Times Friday 24 June 1949 reported.

A letter from Major H.M. Whittell read to members of the Bridgetown Road Board pointed out that many documents dealing with the early history of Bridgetown and surrounding districts were being gathered together by the Bridgetown Historical Society and it was necessary to have a filing cabinet of some description to house them.

After some discussion as to the cost of such a cabinet, it was decided that the matter be left in the hands of the board's historical committee with power to act and purchase if a suitable cabinet can be procured for £10 or less.

The chairman, Mr. M. Scott, suggested that only members of the historical committee and Major Whittell be permitted to peruse the files until the indexing was completed. Board agreed that such steps should be taken.

In 1950, The Blackwood Times noted the St. John Ambulance Sub- Centre action: Major H. M. Whittell, who is secretary of the Bridgetown Road Board's Historical Records Committee, was granted the use of the sub-centre's minute books dating from 1933, and they will be filed in the special cabinet in the board room for safe keeping.

Sadly, in February 1954 Major H. M. Whittell died, and it was reported that: Bridgetown Loses a Most Valuable Soldier Resident

Ex-Servicemen of many units marched again at Bridgetown when the funeral of Major Hubert Massey Whittell, OBE, took place on the Tuesday afternoon, with military honours, Major Whittell, who was 70 years of age, passed away at Nannup District Hospital on Sunday, after a long illness during which time he also received treatment in city hospitals. He came to Bridgetown in 1926.

From these small beginnings the BHS has grown to a flourishing Historical Society and now has more storage than a solitary filing cabinet. A Museum, an archive shed, a dedicated BHS headquarters and most importantly a copy of the original township plan surveyed by Thomas Carey. A township that Carey described could only be "a mere country village".

Mary Elgar, Chairperson of BHS used this description from Thomas Carey as the title of her book published in 2018. "A Mere Country Village" celebrated 150 years of history and development from 1868 to 2018. Perhaps Major Hubert Massey Whittell, OBE, would be well pleased. Lee Wittenoom

They purchased a 112-acre property along the Winnejup road and are running 'UltraWhite' sheep which is a breed of sheep that is a mix of Pole Dorsets crossed with the Dorper sheep.

The UltraWhite is a wool shedding, meat producing sheep. The development of the UltraWhite breed started in 2005, when Dawson Bradford Snr saw an opportunity to breed a high performance, fast growing, low maintenance, wool shedding sheep called the 'easy care'.

Colin joined the Řotary Club around twelve months ago, and jokingly said, "When it came time to elect the new president volunteers were asked to step forward, mostly those around me stepped backward leaving me in the spotlight.

"It's a position I welcome, pretty much I see it will be business as usual with our main fundraising events, The Blackwood Marathon, The Tour of the Blackwood and Up Close and Classical.

"One of my first jobs was to hand over the monies raised from the Rotary Tour of Blackwood. The monies raised from this event support Youth Mental Health in the region most of which will go back into the community via Blackwood Youth Action Inc (BYA).

"Bridgetown Rotary Club has committed \$60,000 for the coming financial year to support youth mental health programs across the Warren Blackwood region.

"For the sixth year running, \$25,000 of the funds raised will support psychological services for young people struggling with mental illness. This year, an additional \$35,000 has been committed to provide seed funding for a youth worker in the

new BYA youth space which is anticipated to open in September 2022.

"Boyup Brook Mental Health has also been assisted with a \$5000 commitment to help fund the bicycle trailer project.

"One of my major priorities over the next two years is to increase our membership which will enable us to continue all the good work the Rotary Club is doing within our community."

Shitbox Rally 2022

Bridgetown's 'Outback Lassies', Michelle Wright and Kathryn Holland are taking part in the Spring Shitbox Rally which will be held from October 15th to October 21st 2022, travelling from Mackay to Darwin via the Savannah Way.

The Rally is not a race, rather it's a challenge to achieve the unthinkable, to drive a 'shitbox of a car' worth no more than \$1,500 across Australia via some of its most formidable roads, all in the name of charity.

The 'Outback Lassies' is a two-person team which needs to raise a minimum of \$5,000 to participate in the rally. They are currently trying to find their 'shitbox of a car' in preparation for the start of the event in Mackay.

There are other stipulations apart from the vehicle being valued at less than \$1,500. It also must be road worthy; the car has to be a two-wheel drive and be able to hold four people.

This is just in case they will need to pick up other fellow competitors whose car may have conked out along the way.

Across the seven days they will drive around 3,300 kilometres, roughly 600 kilometres a day.

All this excitement and adventure is in order to raise money for the Cancer Council as well as to bring attention to the work and support the Cancer Council gives to those who are affected by cancer.

Feeding Your Soil Microbes With Simple Home-Made Recipes

In this series of articles I have written much about why agriculture needs to change. In this article I offer four recipes I am assessing that seem to be having favourable effect - if the photo of the 8-week-old cabbages is an indication. I have prepared a similar article for the Blackwood Valley Small Landholders newsletter, and I included these recipes on my handout accompanying my talk at the recent Post Bushfire Workshop put on by Blackwood Biosecurity Inc. Recipes 1-3 come from 'Soil Food Web Australia' in an article by Simon Webster. You can find the original at: https://www. organicgardener.com.au/articles/how-make-compost-tea I heard about recipe 4 at a workshop a few years ago run by Nicole Masters, a specialist in soil microbiology.

Below are the four recipes. The quantities quoted are aimed at the small producer but can be scaled up by farmers who want to cover large areas with boom sprayers. The equipment you will need are a brewing vessel (I use a plastic dustbin), an aerator (I use an aquarium air pump) and a measuring cylinder as well as buckets and watering cans. The only other thing you will need is a 'bag' to put the compost in. A small muslin bag would be ideal. The materials you will use are Fish hydrolysate, Liquid Kelp, small quantities of reasonable Compost, Molasses, and a small amount of Lucerne hay. All the equipment and materials are available in Bridgetown. Fish hydrolysate is made from whole fish, broken down by enzymes rather than heat. It contains fish oils that are good food for fungi. 'Hydrofish' is a locally available example. The more commonly found fish emulsion is less effective at growing fungi but will suffice as a substitute if necessary. Rainwater is better than town water because it contains no chlorine (microbes don't like chlorine). If you only have town water available bubble air through it for 30

minutes to remove the chlorine before adding anything. You will see that you don't need very much compost tea to cover a large area.

Recipe 1: General purpose tea (Balanced fungal-bacterial brew for any use)

Twenty litres water, 80ml fish hydrolysate, 40ml liquid kelp and 200g compost will produce a tea concentrate enough for one acre.

Add water to bin. Add food (fish and kelp juices) to water. ...continued page 14

How did you go with Plastic Free July? It's not easy, but every bit helps!

Simple changes like: buying in bulk, using your own keep-cup and using crockery instead of plastic at events and morning teas will make a positive difference. Several businesses in town stock some beautiful pottery keep cups. Also, you can also find keep cups available in our wonderful local Op Shops.

Occasionally we do need to buy something made from plastic, our suggestion is to try to avoid plastics that are not recyclable. Anything that is a composite of different plastics is not recyclable. Tetrapak cartons, for example, are not recyclable as they are made from several different types of plastic. There is more detailed information on the Transition Bridgetown website and Facebook page. Check it out!

In 2019 the WA Government received over 9,400 submissions indicating strong support for reducing the impacts of single-use plastics. As you are no doubt aware, as from 1 July 2022, businesses cannot supply any plastic shopping bags, disposable plastic utensils, plastic food containers or expanded polystyrene food ware.

Did you know that it is also illegal to release a balloon into the air? From 1 October 2022, businesses will not be allowed to supply disposable plastic cups for cold drinks. Planning for the next round of bans begins 1 January 2023 and are expected to be enforced by 1 July 2023. If you run a business, you can contribute to the consultation/planning process. Register on the website plasticsbanwa.com.au to receive updates on this consultation process.

Having a large cast presents us with a whole new set of problems, not all can be there on every rehearsal night but others take over their roles, giving them an insight into how the other roles are played.

"Aaron McKnight, the repertory president, has managed to secure funding to improve the lighting. All the stage lights are now LED which allow us to have the best light stage we have ever had. There is also a very good 'supertrooper' spot light which will make those highlighted on stage dazzle."

Dad's Army is humorous and nostalgic. The actors who will be bringing this show to life have all commented on how much fun they are having with the production of the play, which guarantees that audiences will have a lot of fun watching it.

The show runs over two extended weekends: Thursday 11th to Sunday 14th August and Thursday 18th to Sunday 21st August, with Friday 12th August being a special gala night that includes nibblies and champagne beforehand to celebrate the Bridgetown Repertory Club's 90th year.

Showing The Way Coleen Russell 1894 Fruit and Produce Show

...Continued from last issue, The town, the dristict and the Society continues to prosper.

On Thursday 29 November 1894, the 10th, Annual Show was held at the Societies Show Yards with a large gathering including the Hon. Sir John Forrest (who opened the Show) and Lady Forrest (this being her first visit to Bridgetown) who arrived by horse and carriage, the Hon. Sir James Lee Steere, the Hon. J.G.C. Foulkes M.L.C., and R.C. Sholl, a Post Master General.

The weather was delightful, the exhibits were both numerous and of excellent quality. The Southern Times reported on "the large amount of energy and enterprise infused into this rapidly progressing and prosperous Society resulting in a display of healthy and sound growth and vigour which has not been equalled this year by any other Society in the colony including the Royal Agricultural Show at Guildford."

Accommodation was not in over demand as per other years as many brought their accommodation with them and tents were to it be seen in all directions.

A great incentive was a combined £20 prize for the Exhibitor with the greatest number of exhibits donated by, The West Australian, Mssrs. A. Knox Brown, G.W. Hester, J. Allnutt (President) and the Society. Great credit was afforded to two exhibitors, J. Allnutt, a resident of the district, who won the prize with 95 exhibits and R.H. Rose Jr., J.P., who conveyed 86 exhibits a distance of 70 miles. To show his exhibits, Mr Rose had to walk his sheep and horses to the grounds and conveyed the remainder by horse and cart.

A feature of the show was stock whipping conducted by Nannup, an aboriginal well known for his prowess, "excited admiration with his command of the whip while testing the exhibits for the prize whip." All exhibits far surpassed anything previously displayed:

Horses 118 - competition, in the light horses and draught horses was keen and the judges Mr R.A. Gholi and W.E. Asha were most careful awarding their decision.

Cattle 163 -these were well worth seeing, representing Hereford, Polled Angus, Jerseys and Shorthorn.

Sheep 80 - attracted much attention and Messrs. Lee Steere and Hester and Mr Rose divided the honours between them. A. Muir Snr judged these sheep and the Pigs.

Pigs 10 - not numerous but of good quality with R.H. Rose Jr. taking out the prizes.

Wine 9 - these splendid samples came as usual from Mr Allnutt's cellar and were judged by W.K. Adam. Dairy

Produce 72 - Classes were fresh butter, salt butter, side of bacon, ham, bread, cheese and eggs. Mrs W.K. Adam judged these along with the Flowers.

Flowers 19 - the cut flowers, was awarded to J. Giblett, with, J. Allnutt taking out 2nd prize and the collection of pressed bush flowers was awarded to Maud Doust.

Produce 140 - cabbage, cauliflower, lettuce, peas, broad beans, onions, carrots, beets, radish, turnips, parsnips and mangel were judged by H.I. Farrell and it was noted that due to the peculiar dry season many samples were of stunted growth.

The wheat was of exceptional standard, chaff was very good, maise, barley and oats good.

Poultry 40 - judged by E. Woodrow, the Leghorns and Plymouth Rocks were good as also the Turkeys with other breeds being Brahma, Spanish and Hamburg. The most frequent winner's names being J. Allnutt, R.H. Rose Jr., H. Doust and R.C. Williams with H. Layman taking out the pair of Crossbreed Fowls. W. Stephen took out the prize for handmade stockwhip (new) not less than 14ft (4.267metres) long.

The President J. Allnutt held a luncheon reception in the Farmers Home for Sir John and Lady Forrest with members of the Society present and about fifty leading Settlers of the District. Discussions focussed around Policies of the Government of this country and the construction of the railway from Donnybrook to Bridgetown $costing \pm 100,000$.

The following morning, the Annual Meeting of the Nelson Agricultural Society was held in the Mechanics Institute. Over forty attended. A letter was read from the Wellington Agricultural and Pastoral Society recommending an amalgamation of the Southern Agricultural Societies.

W.A.G. Walter moved that this not be entertained at present. John Allnutt J.P. was unanimously re-elected as President with R.C. Williams as Secretary, noting that, "at such short notice of three weeks prior to the show, Mr Williams had taken up the business in a most able manner and carried it through successfully." Messrs W.A.G. Walter and H. Layman were appointed as Auditors. It was voted the Show luncheon be moved from midday to an evening affair.

After a long dry spell of very hot weather and Friday 7th December topping 100 degrees Fahrenheit in the shade, the heavens at last broke with 50 points (12 1/2 mm) being recorded by 9am on the Monday morning. The local Correspondent reported in The Southern Times; "The rain fell in forrents and by Tuesday is still continuing. The long spell of dry hot weather has caused much sickness and the rain was most welcome, not only to quench the thirsty land but to clear the air. Some, who have hay about, will suffer damage. Although the Nelson Show has been the most successful of any in the colony this year, it would have been more successful had it been held a few weeks earlier. With an increase of 100 exhibits over and above last years, we feel proud, and justly so, to think we have excelled over the Royal. Our Society, with only 10 years standing, without the facilities of railway, has exceeded our own expectations."

The Correspondent noted the large number of farmers now having reapers and binders and doubled furrow ploughs and he felt as soon as the railway extended to Bridgetown there would be a great increase of machinery. The Society needed to increase prize money as an incentive in the future for such machinery. James Scott, late of the Farmers' Home Hotel had opened his store, J. Smith had moved to his new building and the town now had three large stores. A Syndicate was being formed to erect a Steam Roller Flour Mill and Saw Mill combined.

The Best Managed Farm for 1894 had only three entries, from B. Needs of 'Perup, Walter of 'Peninsula' and J. Allnutt of 'The Grange'. Overall totals were Needs 564, Walter 563 and Allnutt with 394.

The Judge, W.E Ash of Harvey, tabled his report to the Society in January of 1895. Everything noted on the farm was allocated points. Livestock, Implements and Machinery, Fertilizer, Crops, Cultivation, Orchard, Vineyard, Garden, Farm Buildings, Land Drainage, Fences, Gates, Bridges, Water Supply, Fodder, Bookkeeping, Management, Rotation of Crops, Daily Management, Subsidiary Aids and Experiments. Points were allocated for each section and then totalled to give the overall winner. Mr Ash suggested future additions include a class of 'Agricultural horses' and a prize for 'Farm team in Harness'. He noted "the French farm horse 'Percheron-Norman' is a model agricultural horse and many of our WA Agricultural Societies would do well to copy some of those in Canada and the United States by importing some of this breed." Mr Ash felt an improvement in cattle breeding was needed and he was surprised at the absence of sheep on all the farms. Each farm lost 20 points for this oversight. He found many other defects in the farm possessions but stated that this same problem existed throughout the colony and farmers were not to blame, "a good/arm wagon is not yet obtainable in Western Australia at a reasonable price." Mr Needs was the only competitor to own a butterworker machine (Chemy's make) but he was deficient in a cream separator, which the others possessed.

Bridal Creeper: managing the spread of this invasive weed

Bridal Creeper flourishes in the winter and we watch with dismay as this aggressive weed spreads on our properties, nature reserves and waterways. This perennial climber is native to southern Africa and a declared weed in WA.

There is a short window of opportunity in the treatment of Bridal Creeper which occurs in early August. This is when the 'rust' fungus is at its most prevalent and can be harvested for use in the management of the weed, and before the berries appear, reducing the spread by birds.

Blackwood Biosecurity Inc. is providing free hands-on workshops in our operational area on making rust spray to manage the spread of Bridal Creeper. This easy to make spray is a biocontrol method using the rust spores from the plant itself and is an effective and safe management method.

The workshop for the Bridgetown area will be held at the Ashbil Community Garden on Saturday 6th August at 10-11am, followed by time for questions.

If you have access to any Bridal Creeper with visible rusty spores, please bring it along. We will also cover the use of low dose Brushoff for use on larger patches. The workshop will be presented by local expert Jenny Dewing. Feeding Your Soil Microbes With Simple Home-Made Recipes

Continued from page 9.... Put compost into 'tea' bag and place in brew and turn on aerator. Brew for 24-30 hours. Dilute between 1:10 and 1:20 and apply. (You

cannot apply too much.) Recipe 2: Vegie patch / grass tea (Bacterial brew for annual vegetables, pastures, and lawns)

Twenty litres water, 30ml fish hydrolysate, 60ml liquid kelp, 10ml blackstrap molasses,

200g compost. Brew and apply as before.

Recipe 3: Orchard or plantation tea (Fungal brew for trees, fruit trees and shrubs) - A bit more complicated.

Step 1: Two hundred grams compost and 10ml fish hydrolysate mixed with 20ml water. Three days before brewing, feed compost by mixing 10ml fish hydrolysate in 20ml of water and sprinkling this over the compost. Keep compost in a cardboard box (the cardboard will absorb any excess moisture and allow compost to breathe) and keep in a warm spot (20-30°C). After 2-3 days the compost will have a 'fuzz' growing over it - this will be laden with fungal spores.

Step 2: Twenty litres water, 80ml fish hydrolysate and 40ml liquid kelp. After the compost has 'fuzzed' add the 'tea bag' of fuzzed compost to the water and nutrients and brew like the general-purpose tea, above.

Recipe 4: Lucerne Hay tea (Protozoa brew). These are larger soil microbes including amoeba and small flagellates and ciliate lifeforms that are important to soil health. (Ideally you would use lucerne hay that has been produced without chemicals.)

Just 250g of lucerne hay in ~20 litres of water. Bubble air through this mix for 36 hours, dilute and apply as with other brews. Application of this will encourage the soil protozoa. The protozoa consume soil bacteria and in the process release plant-available Nitrogen. This is a lot cheaper than Urea that is currently around \$1,400 / tonne!

The original article advises: In hot summer weather reduce food and brewing time. With overnight temperatures above 20°C, brewing will take only 18 hours and food should be halved. In chilly weather you might give the brewing a little more time. Teas should be used within four hours of brewing and turning off the air pump, before oxygen and microbe levels drop.

If you have been using chemical fertilisers in the past it is not advised to make a sharp change from fertiliser to compost teas. There should be a period of weaning away from chemical fertilisers to avoid a drop in production until the microbes have taken over. Some people recommend halving the quantity of chemical fertilisers each year over 3-4 years while applying the compost teas. After 3-4 years of halving the amount of chemical fertiliser each year their application can be stopped. By that time the microbes should have taken over.
