of the Year is cyber safety educator and campaigner Paul Litherland.

Paul's award is a timely one, for cybercrime, cyberbullying and cyber criminals are all to prevalent in Australia today.

The on-line world and the way it has been developing has changed the way we live mostly for the better, the pitfalls of the on-line world have come about by the ungoverned development which has exposed us to those who will take advantage. Last year in Australia over 175 million dollars was scammed, this has been a wakeup call. Bullying no longer stops when you leave school, the sports field or work, it follows you 24 hours a day.

Paul's story is that of a Western Australian policeman who became a cybersafety crusader, surrendering his blue uniform to help educate Perth teens about the perils of cybercrime and social networking.

In the last five years of his career as a police officer in Western Australia, Paul Litherland worked in the force's Technology Crime Unit. While there, he became acutely aware of just how vulnerable kids were on the internet. He also felt frustration at the lack of legislation available to help fight internet crime.

In response, Paul began conducting cyber safety presentations at schools.

By 2014, he'd turned his passion into a business by founding Surf Online Safe to educate teachers, students and parents about internet awareness and safety.

Today he's one of Australia's leading experts in the field. Paul has spoken at more than 700 schools and organisations across the country, sharing his cyber safety educational presentations with upwards of 350,000 people.

Speaking to Paul Litherland about his expertise was a pleasure, he was freely giving of his time and knowledge, he expressed some of his concerns, "Whilst apps and programs are developed for good, it the way they can be used or manipulated that is the concern. The biggest concern with social media is that it's anonymous, so it's harder to hold anyone to account. continued page 14

The Rabbit Hole, where to now

Earlier this year, proprietor Jenny Mountford announced to the community that at the end of this year she would be giving The Rabbit Hole to the community so that from that point it could be run as a not-for-porfit Community Arts Hub, owned and operated by the community.

The opportunities for local artists and the broader community will be greatly enhanced by this move as the facility will now be able to seek grant funding to provide more art based programmes at cheaper prices, broader exposure to top level facilitators, increased exhibition opportunities and added infrastructure to develop the space.

A small Focus Group was formed to help organise the transition from private ownership to a community facility and a great deal of work has taken place to make this happen. From next year that group will concentrate on ensuring The Rabbit Hole continues to run smoothly and with a resident Rabbit Hole artist on that group, the artist perspective will continue to be key.

A recent call for community volunteers to get involved next year has resulted in 10 people expressing interest. This has been a hugely encouraging sign that locals are keen to take part in this community endeavour and provides great confidence that the idea is being embraced. There will be an afternoon tea at The Rabbit Hole on Friday December 10 at 3.30 for all those keen to get involved - all welcome! An outline of how the space will be run next year will be provided at that afternoon tea and a range of small duties needing someone to take care of will be offered for volunteers to elect what they would like to take on a couple of hours a week, a couple of hours a month, at flexible times or at one of the 2-3 main events during the year. No task has been set as arduous or a huge time commitment and the Focus Group is anticipating this will make volunteering at The Rabbit Hole easy and pleasurable and will ensure there is someone specific to call on for every aspect of the operation.

TALISON LITHIUM MINE NEWS – DECEMBER 2021

Wow, we are fast approaching the end of another year – one which has presented (and continues to present) many challenges. On behalf of all the team at Greenbushes I would like to wish all readers a merry festive season and hope you can spend some quality time with loved ones during the upcoming Xmas/New Year period.

The Resources Industry Worker (Restrictions on Access) Directions (No 2) (**Directions**) as issued by the Western Australian Chief Health Officer on 12 November 2021 are resulting in a very challenging time for both Talison and a number of its employees. Talison is required by Law to comply with the Directions and this will have a number of impacts including, but not limited to:

- loss of employment for those employees who have made the considered decision not to be vaccinated against COVID-19. It should be noted that Talison has always respected the right of personnel not to be vaccinated and their loss of employment is not because they are not vaccinated but because they cannot fulfill the requirements of their role as a result of being precluded from accessing the Mine as a result of the Directions:
- closure of the public lookout in Greenbushes. The public lookout sits within the Mine Development Envelope (MDE) and as such falls under the requirements of the Directions which requires all visitors to the Mine to be vaccinated. This is very disappointing and an unintended consequence of the Directions. Talison will be exploring ways to remove this restriction in coming weeks; and
- preclusion of any person who is not vaccinated from accessing the Mine – which includes visitors.

Talison has started pre-planning for the inevitable

occurrence of positive COVID-19 cases within the workforce once the Western Australian border restrictions are eased next year.

Talison was again a major sponsor of the Tour of Margaret River Cycle Race for 2021 and it was great to see a stage finish again in Greenbushes this year (after missing out in 2020). By all accounts the event was again very successful and I look forward to Greenbushes continuing to host a stage finish in coming years.

Talison again had the opportunity to sponsor and attend the Bridgetown Show during the month. The Talison tent was

once again visited by a large number of people with the sand pit as always being a great attraction for the littlies. Congratulations must go to Debbie Walsh and Chantelle McKay for their efforts in putting the display and activities together and also to the many volunteers who assisted on the day.

Well done to Scott Chapman (Process Supervisor), Chris Sharp (Construction Supervisor), Craig Boyle (LV Mechanic) and John Guest (Process Operator) who all celebrated a three (3) year service milestone with Greenbushes during the month.

Well done to Kuy Laplanche (Senior Matallurgist) who celebrated a five (5) year service milestone with Greenbushes during the month.

Well done to Hamish Hume (Process Operator), Travis Moore (Process Supervisor) and Michael Ruuwaard (Acting Team Leader – Laboratory) who all celebrated a ten (10) year service milestone with Greenbushes during the month.

Processing operations continue at pace with both the Technical Grade Plant (TGP) and Chemical Grade Plant #1 (CGP1) operating at full capacity during the month. The ramp-up of Chemical Grade Plant #2 (CGP2) continues, albeit slower than planned. Recruitment for the new Tailings Retreatment Plant (TRP) is well advanced and I look forward to this new plant commencing operations in January next year.

Mining activities during the month were assisted by some decent weather (finally) with material movement volumes again in the range of 500,000 bank cubic metres (bcm). Good progress was made with the bulk earthworks for the new Mine Services Area (MSA) and these are expected to be completed as planned by the end of November.

Construction of the Tailings Retreatment Plant (TRP) continued during the month. Progress has been steady as manning reached the required levels. Construction of this plant is due for completion in January 2022. Craig Dawson General Manager-Operations

Totem Bohemia

A new little shop in Bridgetown which is delightful and surprising is operated by Cassi Jo Davis, a shop named Totem Bohemia

In the back of the shop Cassi has drawers full of recycled silks, velvets, bedspreads and other textiles. All precious materials. Jars of buttons, boxes of belt buckles, laces and embroidery threads she has collected through the years.

Cassi then repurposes these materials with inspiration into fine art wall art pieces, bespoke clothing, wearables, antiques and interior pieces which she sells in the shop.

The wall art is of three dimensions. Starting with canvas Cassi extensively researches and draws the imagery, then adding antique and vintage textiles that have been ripped, stitched, embroidered, layering them into a collage, painting and then embroidered with thread for imagery. Her art will always have a story and meaning which Cassi has empathy with.

Cassi studio in the back half of Totem Bohemia where she creates her items to sell when she's not dealing with customers.

As an example there is a vest in the shop, the front panels are made from two pairs of denim jeans, with the back panel being from a Japanese silk embroidered panel of a Garden.

"I'm against fast fashion and believes we need to reduce our textile waste, which is why I deconstructs textile and vintage clothing to use within my clothing range." Cassi was eager emphasise.

Cassi has made a wearable art dress called 'The River', its design was inspired by Adele's song 'River Lea'.

"The dress was made for the wearable art exhibition held at 'The Rabbit Hole Studios' during the Winter Festival earlier this year. The Dress is now in an exhibition called 'Solastalgia' at Lost Eden Gallery, Dwellingup to raise awareness for Old Growth Forest logging with 80 of WA's top artists joining forces for the exhibition. "The song, River Lea, speaks to my own connection to the Blackwood River, how it is a place of healing but also how our river gets into our blood, into our veins and I believe in Bridgetown we all have its reeds growing from our fingertips.

"It gets under our skin and we can never forget the Blackwood River, for me I'm constantly drawn back to it." Cassi explains.

This dress is made from completely recycled hand dyed silk remnants and offcuts from a fashion house and antique silk

velvet remnants from Cassi's collection. The fabrics have been ripped and reconstructed to make the skirt. It combines the textiles with freehand embroidery and textile paint to create the imagery. The text is also embroidered freehand.

Cassi also buys and sell curated antique fabrics, buttons and other materials in the shop and stocks other handmade items from local textile artist in the shop. She also stocks quality unique and handmade clothing from around the world, items.

Totem Bohemia is a gallery, boutique, gift shop and studio all in one place. It's a worthwhile shop for having a browse.

"The friendship we four ladies have formed, where we encourage each other in a non-judgmental way has made for a very productive environment which is giving first class results."

Manida, who now is living in Bridgetown, started her art career around twenty years ago, starting an art degree.

"My love for art started with watercolours. My paintings were flora and fauna in nature, mostly photo realism works.

"Getting on with life took over, the usual demands with work and family, and because I wasn't really enjoying the art I was doing, my art and the degree were all put to one side.

"Through the newly found combined friendship within the group my love of producing art has been rekindled.


"Through the 'Abstract Expressionist' style I use, my art is still botanical in nature but I'm expressing myself in a very personal, rewarding way.



Are mineral deficiencies making us sick? Adrian Williams

Life expectancy in Australia has always increased generation after generation. But in 2011 life expectancy stopped increasing. The main reason for this is the increase in deaths due to 'non-communicable' diseases. First amongst these is cardiovascular disease (CVD), followed (in varying order) by dementia/Alzheimer's disease, stroke, cancers, and diabetes. The World Health Organisation has reported on risks of non-communicable disease due to essential mineral deficiencies. Some of these risks include osteoporosis (deficient Calcium), brain development, ADHD, mental problems, poor pregnancy outcomes (deficient Iodine), CVD, cancers, mental problems (deficient Iron, Magnesium, Selenium), kidney disease, learning difficulties (deficient Iron), diabetes, MS, asthma, allergies (variously deficient Magnesium, Selenium and Zinc), decreased fertility (deficient Selenium and Zinc) and low immunity to infection (deficient Magnesium, Selenium and Zinc). (This is in no way the whole suite of essential minerals.) There is no end of ideas on good diets and what to eat and what to avoid to stay healthy, but little attention seems to be paid to our intake of essential minerals and vitamins.

I heard at a workshop in 2017 that food today has substantially fewer essential minerals than it did in the 1940s. So began 4 years (so far) of part-time online research into the consequences and causes of such declines. Here is a little of what I have found, which I think is important enough to share. All the information in this article comes from legitimate, peer-reviewed papers and reports. So, are we mineral deficient in Australia or is this a Third World problem?

In 2015 the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) published figures from a survey in 2011-12 across a sample population of Australians. The figure below shows that significant numbers of Australians do not consume enough essential minerals, and for some minerals this starts from an early age.



So, what has happened? Apart from poor food choices in some cases caused by poverty - food has lower levels of minerals than it once did. One of the best long-term studies of mineral decline comes from the UK.

I have not found a comparable study in Australia, but we might expect similar changes in food because our food production systems are similar. In the UK over 60 years (1940-2002), average declines in minerals over 27 kinds of vegetables include a staggering 76% decrease in Copper, 46% decrease in Calcium, and falls in Iron and Magnesium in the mid 20%s. Mineral declines in 10 kinds of meat show similar results with a whopping 54% decrease in Iron, 41% fall in Calcium, and mid 20% declines in Copper and Phosphorus. (This means that the livestock that produced the meat were themselves deficient.) The Federal Government appears to be aware of the problem since it is now law that salt used in bread making must be iodised. However, this is not needed if the grain from which the bread is made was grown 'organically'. Could that be a pointer to a different farming future? Knowing about this problem is a first step. In later articles I shall try to explain why food contains less minerals and what can be done about that.

"The only way at the moment to contact social media companies is through the eSafety Commissioner of Australia.

"One measure I would like to see implemented is for social media companies to be made to provide a phone service. One person, 24 hours a day who is answerable or contactable on the phone for every 10,000 users or members these platforms have, it would go a long way in providing quick answers and solutions to combat online abuse and help lessen the impact cyberbullying has on our youth."

Pupils at schools across WA are being encouraged to be more savvy about safety when using social networking sites. The biggest risk is 'over-sharing'.

The key message to parents and children using social media platforms is to never send photos of yourself and to never meet someone in real life that you met on the internet.

The advice comes from expert in software practice at UWA, Dr David Glance, who said the only real solution was to bring in regulations to make companies like "Kik and Facebook accountable for the damage they cause".

"One such app giving concern at the moment is AirDrop. This app can be used by teachers and team leaders alike on an Airdrop network to send homework or routines to all the phones in the whole classroom at once.

"When this app is not in use the privacy setting should move from public to private and left on private.

"The AirDrop feature can be used as a conduit for bullying in primary schools.

'What I'm seeing a lot of is a group of 30 kids will be sitting in a classroom and someone will create a meme like 'I hate you' or 'you suck', and then send that to a student within the class.

"The sender of the image will change the name of their device so it can't be detected across the AirDrop network, so nobody will have any idea who sent it.

"The anonymous messaging apps have caused a "massive" spike in cyber-bullying, the messaging app Sarahah has surged in popularity in Australia, particularly among young girls.

"Sarahah was similar to another social media site, Ask.fm, which had been linked to a number of teen

suicides a few years ago.

"The lack of accountability for many new social media platforms was extremely frustrating. Mr Litherland said it was vitally important for parents to keep up to date with the evolution of social media.

Fitness fanatics are being warned to check the settings on popular exercise apps after an investigation by The Sunday Times reveals how easily the personal information of people using tracking devices such as home and work addresses can be found.

In just one hour, an analyst was able to uncover the profiles of 132 West Australians on fitness app MapMvRun.

The other area of concern is all the scams that are apparent. Last year Australia lost over 175 million dollars to scammers.

Some scams are almost 'laughable', those that have hotmail or gmail email addresses and purport to come from the Tax Office, Centrelink, ANZ, Telstra, Commonwealth Bank, Australia Post, so the list goes on.

But the scammers do hit the mark, and when they find a mark, it's a very lucrative business.

"A scammer can appear with a mobile phone number and an email address, operate his scam with a fake temporary email address for a month then close down, seemingly with no liability.

"Again, as with social media, the platforms which supply email addresses need to made accountable. There should be no anonymous addresses. These platforms should be made to only issue email address to those who can prove their identity, and these records should be held for a least five years.

"Again, we need to be more savvy, when purchases on-line, never make payments to people who only have a mobile phone, a business that has a land line will have an address, and if you are concerned, always seek out their business address to make sure they exist.

"But still it is too easy to be drawn in, one very successful scam was with V-bucks. V-bucks are used by gamers, to buy better armour, more ammunition or magic powers for gamers to advance in their games quicker. A site opened up in the Philippines selling V-bucks for around half the price, they scam millions with the promise of cheap V-bucks and then closed down and disappeared all to easily.

"The best lessons we learn in life are those we learn from our mistakes, the lessons we learn this way are the longer lasting, 'once bitten, twice shy' is the sage advice we have all been given at one time.

"I do not consider or call myself an expert! My ego is not that big! I am just someone who wants to make a difference and I believe I am. It is my ultimate goal to drive change here and overseas, to make the online world safer for all of us, especially our kids. My experience, knowledge and motivation will hopefully help me reach that goal and if I can help as many people as I can along the way, then I will continue to be proud of that." Zac sensing something with the husband approached him and placed his head on the stranger's shoulder alongside his neck, evoking tears from the stranger. The day before he'd been diagnosed with throat cancer, the cancer being exactly where Zac had rested his face.

"Zac works three days a week. On Mondays he works in Manjimup with Special Needs children, those who are autistic and anxious. His size, stature and nature combine to induce a sense of wonderment and a calming effect.

"On Wednesdays he visits Balingup Primary School, here his company is used as a reward for those children who have tried hard, shown improvement, been helpful or as a comfort to children who are sad. Zac's gentleness always makes a difference.

"On Fridays Zac is a 'Therapy Dog' at Geegeelup Village. At Geegeelup hostel he has a welcoming cohort of 'old friends' he has visited over time, receiving all the pats and cuddles and welcoming gestures which are on offer, he is always looking to make new friends, seeking out those who would like some friendly intercourse.

"I find I can't wear any eye makeup on these outings, Zac's interaction with the residents for me is very emotional.

"His size and presence have always attracted attention, he seems to draw a crowd.

"Children are attracted to Zac with a sense of wonderment, he is such a large and unusual animal."

Sue and Zac are accredited with Animal Companions Inc. WA, which is a not-for-profit organisation based in Western Australia. It was established by a dedicated team of volunteers, whose desire is to share the joy of their dogs with people in need in the community.

A Little Gem from St Paul's

Dale Kerber has played the pipe organ at St Paul's church since 1988, this was when she moved to Bridgetown after being appointed as a teacher at the High School.

When arriving in Bridgetown Dale was of the Lutheran religion, but with no Lutheran church here she then attended St Paul's an Anglican church, which had a pipe organ.

Dale tells her story about the organ, "I was pleasantly surprised to find a pipe organ in Bridgetown. It has an electric blower so it starts immediately. The pipes are enclosed in a box to maintain an even temperature which gives a constant note.

"The box has shutters around it that can be opened to increase the volume of the organ. The keys have electric switches which open and close the values on the pipes.

"The organ has wooden pipes and metal pipes; the wooden pipes have a mellow sound and are played by a Diapson Stop. The metal pipes have a Flute sound stop, the shorter the pipes the higher pitch the sound, longer the pipes the lower the notes.

"The organ is so well built and designed it requires little maintenance, it is tuned around once every five years or so.

"The most surprising feature of this organ, for me, is that the organ was built by Paul Hufner, my father. I had no idea this was the case, discovering the link much later.

"My father was piano tuner and organ builder and worked building and tuning organs around Perth up to the year 2000.

"He had built the console and the wooden pipes and used imported metal pipes in the organ at St Paul's.

"The organ was first situated in a church in South Perth, my father moved it to Bridgetown in 1976.

"Mr Harry Moyes was the person who negotiated with my father to have the organ moved here.

"Harry was quite chuffed to learn I was the organ builder's daughter, playing on an organ which was built by my father.


"Harry always thought of the organ music as something special. At the end of the service as the parishioners were leaving the church he would come up to the organ and I would play a tune for him so he could sing a hymn for his own pleasure.

"It seemed to always make his day."
