The Rotary Blackwood Marathon Now In its 43rd year, the Rotary Blackwood Marathon Relay is on again

on Saturday, 29th October 2022. So, it's time to get your teams together and get training!

Bridgetown's Rotary President Collin Booth speaks about the event, "The Marathon is one of the Bridgetown Rotary Club's major fund-raising events for the year, we are excited to see it back without any Covid-19 restrictions.

"Being new to town, I was a volunteer at last year's event, so I got to witness first hand the reason the marathon has been so successful through the years, the competitors come from all over the south west and metropolitan area to compete and they just love this event.



"This year the organizing committee have had to make a few changes to the course because of safe public access at certain points, the canoe leg this year will be shortened by around two kilometres, it will start at Jaye's Road near Terry Road Bridge, go upstream and then do a U turn and come back down again to the bridge for the change over to the swimming leg.

"The running leg also has been moved to run along Terry Road to keep off the main road but is the same length.

"This year we are also in planning for some 'Post Event' entertainment.

"We are grateful to have our regular caterers return, including Tony Practico's icecream van, Lion's food van, the football club's bar and the Cidery.

"This year we have ongoing business partners sponsoring the event: Talison, the Shire of Bridgetown-Greenbushes and Healthway Live Lighter. We appreciate their support as it helps make the event such a successful one.

"So far this year we have over fifty-six teams that have registered, which is well ahead of where we were last year, so the indications are we will have a well-supported marathon, so now's the time to get your teams together and get training and get registered. *continued page 11*

Our Shire's Sustainable Advisory Committee

This will be the first of many monthly articles to come from members of Shire's Sustainable Advisory Committee (SAC). As a group of passionate locals, we wish to share our knowledge with the community through regular articles kindly published here in the Mailbag. The article topics will vary greatly, eg. minimising waste at local events, regenerative agriculture, plant pollination, verge trees and much more. Essentially, they will be informative articles revolving around ways we can individually and collectively approach climate change mitigation and adaptation, plus discuss sustainability topics in general.

As an introduction; SAC is an advisory committee to the Shire Council and our role therefore is to advise Council on issues of sustainability that affect, or could affect our region and residents. Committee members are locals drawn from many walks of life, all with skills and experience in matters of sustainability – environmental, economic and social, including two councillors, Cr Boyle and Cr Lansdell and the Executive Officer is Alexa Tunmer, the Shire's Waste and Environmental Officer.

SAC was formed in 2008 and in its earlier days was particularly busy with reviewing Council policies, such as Environmental Code of Conduct, Natural Environment Strategy and Strategic Plans. In the last few years, the committee has been identifying the environmental risks that will arise in our Shire due to Climate Change.

SAC created a document, endorsed by Council in March 2020, called the Environmental Risks Assessment (ERA) that outlines relevant local climate change mitigation actions that may help make Bridgetown-Greenbushes be a safer, more enjoyable place to live, work, visit and retire, with social and economic benefits. *Continued page 14*



Showing The Way Coleen Russell 1895

During this year the Houses of Parliament in Western Australia pass Legislation to extend the railway from Donnybrook to Bridgetown; a new feature for the show is also introduced, the Challenge Cup, a prize for the best managed farm, Showing the Way continues.

By April, and with a lack of rain, the white frosts were cutting down the pumpkins and vines in the district. Most of the fruit had been gathered and crops generally were very good although with a glut of fruit in the Perth and Fremantle area, prices were lower early in the season. The Government Entomologist had visited Bridgetown in search of Codlin Moth ('Cod/in 'as spelt by the Department of Agriculture I January 1898 and later spelt 'Codling'), which luckily he was unable to find. This was the most damaging insect pest of apples and pears where the adult moth mates and lays miniature eggs in the bark of the tree, then hatches larvae which tunnel into the fruit, feeding on the seeds. They then leave the fruit and pupate in the same way. The settlers hoped that with his next visit he would be able to show them how to destroy the insect pests that constantly played havoc with the fruit trees of some settlers.

Although there was no documentation found of any changes to the Mechanics Institute around this time, it is clear that work was in progress, as the Bridgetown correspondent for The Southern Times reported, on 8 April, that additions to the Mechanics Institute were nearing completion and only needed a fleche (spire), a part of which was coming from South Australia, to finish the contract. "We shall then possess the best public room in any of the Country towns of the Colony and the work reflects credit upon both the Architect and Contractor."

Delegates from the Nelson Agricultural Society attended the annual Conference in Perth in connection with the Bureau of Agriculture, having received instructions for certain resolutions to be presented. The Bridgetown Turf Club Secretary, J.W. Blechynden posted an article of interest in The Southern Times stating that the Clubs Annual Meeting would be held on 17th April. The Stewards were Messrs. L.C. Moulton, J.R. Walter, L.R. Armstrong, G.N. Allnutt and H. Layman, Judge; W.A.G. Walter, Handicapper; Chas. Layman, Clerk of Scales and Stand was J.R. Walter, Starter; G. Allnutt and Clerk of Course; F.G. Allnutt.

The Programme had seven events; Maiden Plate, Pony Race, Selling Race, Blackwood Stakes, Breeders Stakes, Hack Race and Ladies Purse. Races were to be run under the WA Turf Club Rules. The Maiden Plate and Blackwood Stakes were open to all comers.

The rest were closed to all horses owned by persons residing more than 35 miles from Bridgetown. The rules stated that; "No one will be allowed to run a horse in event numbers 1, 3, 4 and 5, who has not subscribed at least 20 shillings towards the funds of the Club and for event numbers 2, 6 and 7, 10 shillings. Admission to the Course is 6 pence. All dogs on the course will be destroyed."

The 11th Annual Nelson Show was 1895 was held on Thursday 28th November, with special guests, the Hon. A.R. Richardson, M.L.A. Commissioner of Crown Lands and the Hon. J.W. Hackett M.L.C, who travelled by a special train from Perth to Donnybrook and then by horse and carriage to be present. The Luncheon held in the Bridgetown Hotel in the afternoon was catered by Host Daw and "gave general satisfaction."

A large attendance joined the President J. Allnutt J.P., the special guests mentioned and the Hon. Sir J.G. Lee Steere, M.L.A. and W. Patterson. The usual loyal toasts were proposed of "The Queen", "The Prince of Wales and the Royal Family" and "His Excellency the Administrator." J.R. Walter proposed the toast of "The Ministry", referring to the presence amongst them having "the power to work incalculable good for the agricultural interests."

A.R. Richards responded, saying the Ministry needed to keep the agricultural interests "forcibly and prominently in view", as "they could be lost in the midst of what could be termed a raging gold fever."

Lukis proposed the toast of "The Houses of Parliament" coupled with the names of the Hon. J.W. Hackett and the Hon. James G. Lee Steere, noting how grateful those present were to the Houses of Parliament for passing Legislation to extend the railway from Donnybrook to Bridgetown.

Mr R.C. Williams was highly commended for his energy and ability to promote the interests of the Society as their Secretary. Presented for the first time was the Challenge Cup donated by J.G. Lee Steere who presented it to J.R. Walter, the winner of the prize for the best managed farm and hoped that Mr Walter would succeed in winning it for three years in succession "so as to obtain permanent possession of it." W.A.G. Walter instituted a new feature in the form of a Garden Prize.

Friday 29th November, the Society held their 11th AGM. The Secretary presented the Annual Report noting there were now about ninety members on the roll. In the Implement Class this year a Smith's Borer and two ploughs made by Messrs. Powell and Ramsay were shown on the grounds and it was hoped when the railway was completed that more machinery would be shown.

The alteration of substituting a dinner in the evening in place of a luncheon at midday was tried this year and judging from the attendance was a decided improvement.

Thanks were extended to Mr Partridge for judging the farms and gardens competitions. His report stated that Mr Walters's farm was the only one where farming was systematically carried out, the rest would more aptly be termed cattle stations and orchards. The buildings were nicely planned and sufficient but not as substantial as they could be, especially the hay shed. The crops were fairly clean, well cultivated and drained. The system of rotation was good though not complete and this was the only farm where fallow was noted.

"The garden is sufficient for home use, the orchard well laid out and cultivated, and the only one I saw on my travels not troubled with American Blight."

The Peninsula took the lead in conservation of water with a good windmill and efficient water service. "In fodder crops Mr Walter has a nice patch of sorghum, Indian corn, and a small experimental pit of ensilage. The implements are sufficient for the requirements of the farm and in good order. The horses are a useful pair, the cows fair and in good condition, the pigs not in good condition."

There was an attempted system of farm accounts and a book showing the rotation and work done on each field. The workshop was very complete as were the buildings. The report on Mr Muir's farm at Deeside read as follows, (it) "is remarkable for extreme neatness and tidiness. The buildings are good, all stock are good and in first-class order and a small vineyard is in splendid order. "There was also mention of small orchards, some bearing fruit, and implements, including a binder, fences and gates all in good order."

Mr Muir has not done much in ringbarking owing to ferns which take possession of the ground as soon as the trees are killed, but his system of grassing is the best. Every bit of manure is most carefully collected and stowed in an enclosure made for that purpose."

"Five sponsors have come onboard with the vehicle, Hemp Square, Bridgetown Windmills, Be You, British Brickwork and Bridgetown Stepping Stones.

"All in all, we are pleased with all the support we are getting. The next two weekends of fundraising events will be very busy for us."

The 'Outback Lassies' have already come a long way in their preparations for the rally, you can support them by attending the quiz night on 10th September in the Town Hall.

The ERA acknowledges that we as a Shire are too small

to have any great influence on climate change on the world stage – except maybe for the lithium it produces to make batteries for electric vehicles? However, real change and a way to influence policies often comes from the actions of the people/communities with a 'bottom-up' approach. The appeal of any bottom-up approach is that individual actions can have a massive impact when adopted by large numbers of people and many of our future articles will focus on these opportunities.

SAC's ERA initiative to some extent also encouraged the formation of the Warren Blackwood Alliance of Councils (WBAC) Climate Change Impact Reference Group, of which Cr Lansdell, Cr Boyle and Ms Tunmer are our Shire's representatives. The subsequent WBAC Climate Change Policy and Action Plan launched early in August, has been developed as an initial roadmap to address the challenges and opportunities that climate change poses for the Warren Blackwood region. This Action Plan contains a range of adaptation, mitigation, advocacy, leadership and communication activities and will provide opportunities for the top-down approach to meet in the middle with the peoples' bottom-up actions and insights.

The Climate Change Action Plan along with the ERA will give SAC plenty to consider, prioritise and advise Council on in the coming years. We understand that 'sustainability' could actually be considered a defunct term now, as the ecological footprint of humanity has exceeded the carrying capacity of Earth since around the 1970s, therefore the current mode of life of humanity is actually completely unsustainable and urgent action and change is needed.

Human's impact on the planet is not only driving climate change but also biodiversity loss. We are fortunate that our Shire has been funding our Community Landcare Officer for 10 years and they update SAC with monthly reports. We would like to wholeheartedly thank recently retired Cheryl Hamence for her sterling work in this role for 32 years and for fostering the continual relationship and dedication of the Helping Hands volunteers caring for our local biodiversity. We now welcome Karrie Williamson to the position.

While SAC's role is to advise Council, its members see that the committee can be a conduit between residents and the Shire Council, and SAC is pleased to receive comments and questions from the community through the Shire Office by phone, email or letters addressed to SAC. We meet monthly and will discuss these at our meetings.

And lastly, SAC wish to thank outgoing member Adrian Williams who has been on the committee from the beginning. Adrian's contributions, wealth of knowledge and guidance has been enormously appreciated and respected.

Blitz on tree pests and diseases

The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development's (DPIRD's) Biosecurity Blitz is back in 2022, with a special focus on reporting tree pests and diseases.

The TREEmendous Biosecurity Blitz aims to protect Western Australia's trees from an increasing number of exotic threats, such the recent incursions of polyphagous shot-hole borer and myrtle rust.

Whether you work in forestry or horticulture, like to bushwalk, have trees in your backyard, in the local park or on your street, you can help protect our trees into the future by checking them for pests and diseases and reporting any you find during the Blitz.

Every report helps to increase the likelihood that serious pests and diseases will be detected early, providing the best opportunity to eradicate or contain them.

If your report turns out to be a common pest, that data is used to support WA's export trade.

30 days to look - snap - report

This year the TREEmendous Biosecurity Blitz runs from 24 September to 24 October 2022 – that's 30 days to look for, take a photo and send in a report of every tree pest and disease in your local area.

Check trees in your backyard, property, local area or nearby bushland for pests and diseases.

Every report gets a response – let's see what's in that tree! You will also receive a weekly email with pest identification and tree health tips, information on priority tree pests, activities, and invitations to webinars and workshops.
