

Celebrating its 90th Anniversary

St. John Ambulance Bridgetown is celebrating 90 years of serving the Bridgetown Greenbushes community.

St. John started in WA in 1903 when the St. John Council of Western Australia sent a squad of First Aid Volunteers to the Royal Show. The following year the first men's division of St. John Ambulance Brigade was formed, the first women's division was formed in 1913. In Perth, St. John took over the ambulance service from the Fire Brigade on the 1st July 1922.

By 1930 there were 50 sub-centers throughout the state. In 1929 Bridgetown had a division of St. John but it was in 1933 the Bridgetown Ambulance Service was formed which we know as it is today.

John Jones has been a member of the Bridgetown Ambulance service for 62 years and has built up a very good knowledge and tells us a few facts about Bridgetown St Johns Ambulance, "Back then, 90 years ago Bridgetown had two sections of St John in town.

"The Operation Section, St John Ambulance Brigade Officers and members were in uniform and carried out public duties rendering first aid in the community and also drove and attended patients in ambulances.

"And the teaching section, the St John Association. It taught first aid to the public and raised finance for the buildings and ambulances. The Association members also drove and attended patients. All of the brigade personnel were also members of the Association. The Brigade side closed down in 1989. All the officers carried on as Association Members in a different uniform.

"It was in 1929 when a division of the brigade was registered. Railway personnel that had been in town since the opening of the railway line to Bridgetown in 1898, are the workers who made up the officers and personnel of this division and used their own vehicles to transport patients to hospital.

"It was these men of this division that requested that the St John Ambulance Association in Perth start a subcentre in Bridgetown. Along with these men and dedication from business people and members of the public the sub-centre was started in July 1933... *Continued page 5*

Greenbushes Golf Club Fundraising Auction

On that fateful day, Saturday 5th February 2022, Bridgetown Golf Club held its regular golfing day, it was planned with the matches starting at 8am finishing around 12 noon. The day was a hot one, with strong and hot north westly winds blowing.

Smoke was spotted to the north of the club house around 12.30 and the players who were still around the club house were advised to leave.

But no one foresaw what was to unfold, and there was little idea as to how quickly the fire was travelling or of its hunger in consuming all in its path.

When the raging fire hit the top of Hester Hill the Bridgetown Golf Club facilities were burned down.

The Club House, the Caretaker's Cottage attached to the club house, and two sheds were all consumed in the blaze.

The club house was a 'treasured headquarters', it was there from the beginning, 1915. It held the honour boards, photographs and memorabilia through its 107 years of local golfing history. It was a building which held a lot of special functions over time. With the building and history on display, members and visitors would recognise names on boards and the faces of those in photographs of members from long ago, it was always a talking point.

In the aftermath of that day, and while volunteers and club members were hand watering the greens a conversation was had between Bruce Pendlebury, Bridgetown Golf Club President and Richard Walker, a Greenbushes Golf Club member, "An auction could be held to raise some funds to go towards building a new Club House, would you like to organize one or would you like me to do it?" Richard asked Bruce. Bruce had the feeling he had enough on his plate already and replied, "You can organize it if you will."

Richard Walker then started the ball rolling by going to his fellow Greenbushes Golf club members for backing, they were all eager to support the auction... Continued Page 14

The story writing competition's main aim was to generate stories that could be used to develop theatre scripts for this year's OUCH Festival.


The theme suggested for the stories was 'empathy' (the ability to understand and share the feelings of another).

"We were excited to be involved with the Rotary club's story competition on the theme of empathy," Meegan Cullen repertory spokesperson explains.



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Bridgetown Historical Society

Much of the history of Bridgetown includes the apple orchards and their encompassing industry. The Allnutt family who settled in Bridgetown in 1864 were instrumental in the development of the apple industry and are acknowledged as the founders of this horticultural activity.

This photo is of a building that many of us in Bridgetown pass by every day, but do you know what it was originally? An apple packing shed on Greys Hill Road.

Shire of Bridgetown Greenbushes Heritage Survey https://www.bridgetown.wa.gov.au/documents/199/ local-heritage-survey-bridgetown-place-records-(part-2) describes this building ...

"Small stone building with brick quoins. Corrugated iron roof. Exposed timber lintels above windows and doors. Doors (including an industrial wooden sliding door), windows and fixtures seem to be in original condition. There is also evidence of a random stone retaining wall/loading dock along the main frontage.

Remnant of the early fruit industry of the district. Presumably the packing shed was built of stone as it was readily available and more importantly for its thermal qualities in helping to keep the building cool in the warmer months.

The following information from the Register of Heritage Places Assessment Documentation for the Paterson & Co Fruit Packing Shed Complex (cnr Bunbury St and Sth West Hwy) provides some historical context for small packing sheds such as this: From 1898 a "daily rail service provided reliable and rapid transport to market, which was necessary for the development of the fruit and dairy industries in the district ... The acreage planted to apples [rose] steadily ... and the importance of the Bridgetown area to apple production was reflected in the rail cartage figures from the town, which increased from 9,702 cases in 1903 to 26,568 cases in 1907 ... Each orchardist initially packed his own fruit, and occasionally several neighbouring orchardists packed together to cut costs ...In 1914, a central packing shed was established at Bridgetown by the Bridgetown Fruitgrowers Association" but private packing sheds appear to have continued to have been used through to the 1930s at least.

It would appear that the Arts and Crafts/Tudor style detailing on the roof gables of the Greys Hill shed has been created since the last recorded photo in 2001, in which the eastern gable was shown to have been in desperate need of repair. Unsure as to the original design and therefore the authenticity of the gables.

The local orchard industry suffered a heavy blow in 1993 as codling moth infestations caused a massive Government encouraged "Tree Pull".

The packing shed on Greys Hill Road is significant as a vernacular stone building, important as a now rare local example of a stone packing shed, and for its contribution to the commercial fruit industry of the district and as a workplace. Increasingly rare evidence of the early fruit growing industry in Bridgetown."

The Shire of Bridgetown-Greenbushes Heritage Survey describes many such places and buildings and is an excellent record of the significance of our Cultural Heritage.

Continued from front page..."Over the next 90 years of the sub-centre's existence 22 chairpersons have shown leadership with strong committees. The first female chairperson in 88 years, Elza Wallis has chaired the sub-centre for the last twenty months.

"The first sub-centre building, a church hall, was purchased for five hundred pounds, and housed a secondhand camper van brought for two hundred and sixty pounds that was converted into the towns first ambulance.

"A new sub-centre was built on the corner of Hampton Street and Lockley Avenue in 1959 at a cost of fifty-five thousand pounds.

"The present-day sub centre building was completed and commissioned in 2007 costing \$700,000. Today it houses three up to date purpose-built fully equipped Mercedes Ambulances, each costing \$200,000.

Bridgetown Sub-Centre now has a paid first aid officer who teaches first aid to the public and schools.

The work load of the volunteer officers has doubled in the last ten years to over 800 call outs for emergencies and hospital transfers each year.

John tells us about the changes he has seen over time and how the service has grown, "The qualifications for ambulance officers has changed from just having a first-aid certificate and a driver's license to six full weekends of training with paramedics, twenty training nights each year to sign off all skill which is required.

"There are now a dedicated day, night, and weekend rostered twelve-hour shifts for both emergencies and for hospital transfers.

"This now requires eight officers every twenty-four hours. The call outs for an ambulance in town has progressed from a siren on a building in Steere Street to a computerised system operated state wide. This change has also seen the recording of patients' information from paper to iPad."




The people involved in the Bridgetown St John Ambulances service are proud of their inheritance and they give their time voluntary to serve the communities of Bridgetown and Greenbushes and quite often to others outside these boundaries.

Officers are called out and respond to anything from applying a band-aid to motor vehicle accidents, cardiac problems, transient ischemic attacks (TIA), and cerebrovascular accidents (CVA), domestic and sporting accidents, the unwell and sick, and for pregnancies and mental health problems."

As of 19th April, St Johns Bridgetown strength is 26 active officers on roster, ten probation officers and four support staff, a total of 40.

The hundreds of people that have given their time over the last ninety years to the present day, have given to our community a lasting service that we all can be proud of.

An Open Day is to held on Saturday 10th June from 10am-2pm. There will be giveaways, bandaging demonstrations, inflatable fun and activities and you will be able to tour your local sub-centre and view the fleet of ambulances with a chance to meet 'Kura Bear'.

Expansion activities at the Mine continue at pace:

- construction of the new Mine Services Area (MSA) is nearing completion with the mining team and new mining contractor (Macmahon) eagerly looking forward to starting to make the transition into the facility during the latter part of June;
- construction of the new Tailings Storage Facility #4 (TSF4) is making good progress due to the lack of significant rain. This facility is vital to the Mine's ongoing operations;
- construction of Chemical Grade Plant #3 (CGP3) has commenced with relocation of the below ground services complete, bulk earthworks nearing completion, civil works at the crusher commenced and piling activities commenced. This plant is still on track for commissioning in the first half of 2025;
- energisation of the new 132kV powerline has occurred and commissioning activities at the new switch yard to the west of Maranup Ford Road have commenced; and
- construction of the temporary camp south of the Mine along Maranup Ford Road is progressing well with buildings being placed into position.

Mining activities continue to exceed the Budget with material movements in excess of 600,000 bank cubic metres (bcm) most months. The cutback of the north western end of the open pit has commenced and is progressing well. This cutback is clearly visible from the Public Mine Lookout in Greenbushes and will afford a great view to members of the public of mining activities as the cutback progresses.

Despite a pretty rocky start to the year the maintenance and processing teams have performed exceptionally well over the last couple of months to bring production volumes back in line with the Budget. Record concentrate production months were recorded in March/April and May also progressed well.

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One of the most common questions Transition Bridgetown gets asked is when the soft plastic recycling might recommence. Soft Plastics Task Force has released an update outlining the steps needed to launch a new supermarket soft plastic collection scheme. Don't hold your breath, but please keep stockpiling your soft plastics. Under the current plan, an initial in-store collection pilot is anticipated to launch in select stores in late 2023 - provided that REDcycle's existing soft plastic stockpiles can be cleared prior. The new program would then be gradually rolled out nationwide next year. In the meantime, as always, try and limit your purchase of anything packaged in soft plastics wherever you can!

Unsure what hard plastics can go in your recycling bin? Those marked PET, HDPE and PP plastics [ie marked with 1, 5, or 2] can go in the Comingled Recycling Bin. If you would like more information or a reference sheet to put on your fridge, please send us an email on transitionbridgetown 19@ gmail.com. We will have more information on our Facebook page throughout June leading up to the challenge of households committing to a Plastic Free July! Doreen Hornby, Greenbushes Golf Club Treasurer, takes us through what happen next, "Richard really did all the leg work, contacting and gathering a wide variety of doners to the auction; Many businesses in town and across the South West provided items for the auction, which included Family swimming passes, a 3.6m mobile stock ramp, a ride-on lawn mower and trailer, hand sewn quilts, motor vehicle parts (tyres, lights and towing equipment), electric golf cars and buggies.

"South West golf clubs provided full and country memberships and playing packages, and businesses across the state donated a variety of vouchers for clothing, beauty and fuel. There was also accommodation and meal packages in Perth and throughout the South West.

"As well as golf equipment, there was supporter gear from WA's major sporting teams Eagles, Dockers, WACA, West Coast Fever and the Wildcats, as well as small and large round bales of hay and a two-hours service of ice-cream, ideal for a child's birthday party or a binge at home, an all you can eat, from Tony Pratico.

"All of us at the Greenbushes Golf Club were amazed at the willingness and generosity of those wanting to contribute to the auction, it seemed the Bridgetown Golf Club losses touched a need to help in the wider community."

The twelve members of the Greenbushes Golf Club, along with other volunteers, held a successful fundraising auction in the Bridgetown Town Hall on Saturday 7th May 2022 to benefit the Bridgetown Golf Club. On behalf of Greenbushes Golf Club President Gordon James sincerely thanks all those who gave their support towards the Auction Night, that night around \$14,000 was raised.

While not all the donated goods were sold at the auction, negotiations with some golf packages and other items were easily sold, then with raffles and stalls the remaining items were all sold over time.

On 18th May 2023, Doreen and Wally Hornby from the Greenbushes Golf Club handed over to Bruce Pendlebury a cheque for \$16,000 from the auction. Earlier, Greenbushes Club held Bridgetown's Men's Veteran's Day at Greenbushes Golf Club and raised \$800 bringing their contribution to \$16,800.

Bruce continues, "Since the fire which destroyed our club house, Bridgetown Golf Club has received a lot of wonderful support from the community, the support has had an uplifting effect on our spirits making the rebuilding process easier.
