Emergency Services Cadets

The Cadet program run at the Bridgetown High School has been recognised for the work it is doing in nurturing our young people and helping develop their resilience.

The program has been running for around twenty years and is open for all students at the high school to attend, and at the moment it has a very even spread of males and females.

The cadets meet and take part in different activities each Tuesday after school.

A dedicated group of volunteers, John Tonai-Moore is the Unit Leader, with Cherie Old, Mike Kneel, Sarah Gardiner, Damion Treloar and Bianca Spice all give their own time to make the program a worthwhile learning experience for the cadets.

The cadets are split up into groups along the lines of the

school year they are in, Year 7, 8, 9 and 10.

The training and experience they receive whilst being in cadets includes; First Aid, Orienteering, Map Reading and Compass skills, Rope work, Fire Safety, Abseiling, Water Base Rescue and Drill work.

The drill work is not only for discipline but so they can march in the ANZAC parade. The Cadets also take part in clean ups, bushfire prevention tasks and helping out the community in times of need.

Each year the students also take part in an overnight camping trip, year 7s will do an overnight stay, building up

to year 10s camping for three days and nights.

John Tonai-Moore who has been involved in the program for nineteen years and is the Unit Leader talks about the cadets, "Each year the cadets numbers start off at around seventy, with some students finding it's not for them, but over the year we have a steady number of fifty cadets taking part in program during the year.



Years Nine and Ten Drama

Drama is a subject the students at Bridgetown High in years seven and eight do as a one term subject.

For year nine and ten students, who have had a taste and like what drama has to offer, they can then partake in the subject for a full year, building on skills, with marks and grades going towards their end of year overall

The current year nine and ten drama class has ten students. Each student brings different abilities to the class, with each student expecting drama to giving them different life skills to take into the community.

The students performed self-scripted 'pantomime' plays in term one. Recently, they wrote and performed monologues, these solo acts made up a staged performance.

The monologues were set in a hospital, with each student playing varying roles. The roles they covered were, an overworked nurse, a distressed pregnant single mother, a surgeon who had experienced loss, and other impatient patients with varying aliments and attitudes.

The characters they played had completely different personalities to their own. The students needed to bring these characters to life by talking and behaving in ways they could only image, thus bringing drama to the story. This was all played out in a supportive environment in front of their peers.

A few of the students would like to share some of their thoughts with you; Amity said, "I like drama for the confidence it gives me, I particularly like playing characters which are male roles, and I like acting where I have an assertive role.

"One day I would like to open a 'themed café' where

the staff play characters. I'm not sure what the theme would be, but the staff would certainly be in a costume."

Adia went to add, "I like memorising scripts, then adopting the personality and troubles of a character who is living a completely different life to that of my own, just for a while, before returning to myself. I also find performing gives me confidence in how to express myself.'

Mia said "I love playing 'whatever character'. The dressing up and acting outrageously is what makes it fun, I

also like boy roles."

Tess also likes playing 'out there' roles, "When I play a role of someone who is hilarious, or has a dim wit which makes people laugh at their silly antics, these are the roles I like.

"When I am in character others have said 'you are so funny', I really like entertaining people. I would like to pursue

a career in theatre or film."

Katie is another one of the students who has been involved in repertory theatre for quite some time, "I like the pantomimes, the dressing up, the challenges of the roles, and just being part of the theatre,

"I feel I will always like to be part of an amateur theatre, as a hobby, it's a pastime which is something worthwhile to do, I like being part of a stage production, onstage and backstage."

Elleqin wanted to say, "I like dressing up and playing the role of a princess, or one as a fairy, just being someone who's special, these are the roles I like.

Taking a part in and becoming another person's character, even for a little while, allows students to explore a different

perspective.

Whether the role is to be a magical one living in a fantasy world, or the other extreme, playing the part of a person who has found themselves caught up in a life changing event and dealing with the consequences, students gain an insight into others' lives and the world around them.

Verge Gardening Open Špace

On the topic of Verge Gardens, the recent Open Space on Waterwise Verge Gardens was an informative event with presenters Jenny Dewing from the Bridgetown Landcare Community Nursery and Dr Erica Shedley from Southern Flora, speaking about the brilliant array of low maintainence native plants that could be suitable for planting on our verges. Shire will be reviewing the Verge Garden policy later this year and hopefully incorporating the Watercorp Waterwise Verge Gardens policy. We certainly have a wealth of knowledge in our community to assist with this.

A Power and Water Saving Tip from Bridgetown Energy Transition (BET)

Like to save both power and water? Yes? Then only boil the water that you need right now. Reboiled water looses its fresh taste too. If you only need 2 cups of water (500ml) then only boil that amount. This uses only 35% of the power needed to boil a full 1.7lt kettle.

A full kettle uses about 0.200 kwh of power to reach the boil, a ½ litre of water uses 0.0700kwh. This saves about 70% of water and power and at the years end, about \$150 off your power bill. Waste Collection

No street party means the road won't be closed but it doesn't mean that we aren't having a food court and stalls. This year we are having the Community Hub in Memorial Park. The area is a fenced, COVID compliant, family area focusing on bring community and festival goers together.

Finally some sun shine now sit back and watch the weeds grow. With a lot of willing hands the garden has been weeded and mulched and is looking very tidy. Well done every one. Now is the time to clean out beds and prepare the soil for planting.

Fertiliser is not the answer to growing the best plants; soil quality is. Add organic amendments such as compost and well-aged manure to your soil. The best soil structure is crumbly, easy to dig, accepts water easily, and is loose enough to provide oxygen for plant roots. If you choose to use fertiliser, use an organic one to add nitrogen, phosphate, and potash (the form of potassium plants can use).

The list of plants to plant in September is extensive, the garden plans to plant asparagus crowns, beans, beetroot, eggplant, kale, lettuce, pumpkin and tomatoes.

The July market and workshop has passed with Bronwyn being very informative regarding the Qualities and Benefits of Herbs and Herbal Teas.

Also Blackwood Biodiversity Inc. informed us of the scourge of Bridal Creeper and how to control it .

Showing The Way Coleen Russell

The Years of Progress 1886 – 1887

A time when a new post office was built and the telegraph line down to Bridgetown was opened to the public. Also a time when the second bridge was failing and the third

bridge was being built.

On Saturday 24 July the Western Mail informed the public of a report from; "the Resident Engineer in the Southern Districts - that the Blackwood Bridge, at Bridgetown, is Unsafe for Heavy Traffic; all persons crossing the same with Loaded Teams, or Mobs of Cattle, are hereby warned that they will do so at their own risk and loss in the event of the bridge giving way. Jas. G. Lee Steere, Chairman Blackwood Roads Board. July 12th, 1886."

At a general meeting on Thursday 30 September 1886, the Society Secretary reported that the proceedings and accounts of the Society had been examined by the President Lee Steere and A.W. Moulton, and certified by them as correct. The balance of cash, together with the Government grant for 1886 totaled £39 11s. With sixty good members on the books, this gave a healthy balance of £100. Following the death of Charles Rose, Jas. G. Thomson was appointed

On 20 August, James S. Gibbs was let the tender for the construction of a new Post Office at Lot 39 Hampton Street. On 29 November, William Carey, Superintendent of Telegraphs and E Woodrow, Postmaster of Bunbury opened the Telegraph line to the public with May Moulton as the Postmistress and Telegraph Operator.

For the Central Southern Districts Second Annual Show held on 9 December 1886, two hundred and twenty two entries were received. Prize money offered was £103 and £93 was paid out, with £4 2s. taken on the gate. At an early hour on Show morning, exhibitors were allotted their respective places by a very energetic Secretary Mr. A. Knox Brown.

The West Australian Monday 27 December stated, "When the hour arrived for judging, through his good management, the gentlemen who kindly undertook to act as judges were enabled to enter without delay upon their arduous duties,." and "Mr. Knox Brown was ably seconded by Mr. James Inglis who took charge of the produce shed, and by Mr. Lee Steere who acted as master of the ring, also by Mr. Moulton who was generally useful." Special mention was made of the flowers which "for variety and beauty surpassed anything ever seen at an agricultural Show in the Colony." The improvement shown in the quantity and quality of the exhibits was most marked, and the great interest taken by the settlers and outside visitors showed what could be done when people tried.

The year closed with a credit of £21 12s. 6d. Due to the distances travelled by horse and or buggy, Council meetings were restricted to two per year, with the AGM always following the day after the show. The annual meeting of the Agricultural Society was held in the Institute and was one of the largest meetings ever held at the Bridge.

The Secretary reported the show's finances to be satisfactory. About twenty new members were elected. Mr. Lee Steere was again elected President Messrs. A. W. Moulton and Thomas Muir, Vice-Presidents, Messrs. W. K. Adam, John Allnutt, Chas. S. Brockman, O.C. Dowden, Thomas Giblett, E. G. Hester, James Inglis, James Guy Thomson and C. F. Roberts the Council and Mr. A. Knox Brown, elected Secretary and Treasurer. The Southern Times printed a list of the forthcoming events and a full report after the show. The larger stock entered were walked from the owners property to the grounds, some coming from the area which is now Manjimup (36 kilometres South) and even further from Bunbury (92 kilometres North). The West Australian Monday 27 December printed "The dance was given on Friday evening, when the famed beauty and manhood of the south had a good time of it. The dancing

was kept up with great spirit till after daylight, when several of the gentlemen sang songs before the regretful parting till another year." Further mention was made of the kindness of Mr. W. K. Adam of the Lower Blackwood who gave the Mechanics' Institute a piano, which would greatly assist the future dances held in the Institute.

1887

In this year the Nelson Road Board established its own office in Bridgetown, separating from the Bunbury Road Board District, taking in the Warren and Upper Blackwood Districts. The members of the first board were Chairman John Allnutt, Edwin Padbury, Edward G. Hester, Thomas Giblett, James Lee Steere and Charles Rose of 'Wilgarrup' with J. Kurtze as Secretary. (Part of the buildings interior is shown in the 1912 photograph of a meeting of the Nelson Agricultural Society Councillors)

The Governor, Sir Frederick Broome, set up a

The Governor, Sir Frederick Broome, set up a Commission of Agriculture in 1887, where its members, all prominent men in rural enterprises, looked into each Districts farming practices in an area covering the South West section (outside of the Pastoral and Wheat Belt area) which started above Perth and included Bridgetown. In 1891 they presented a report giving a colourful account. Many long established farmers knew that superphosphate and guano, (bird excreta mined from 1884 at Houtman's Abrolhos, west of Geraldton), would benefit their crops, but due to the cost of its purchase and transport they still relied on the practice of animal manures and fallowing (resting

the land to restore its fertility).

Documentation in the Police Occurrence Book for 1887, showed Henry Doust being given permission to trade at the Showgrounds for the Third Annual Show Day of the Central Southern Districts Agricultural Society held on 15 December under the presidency of the Hon. J. G. Lee Steere, M.L.C., M.F.C. There was much enthusiasm with plenty of visitors from Bunbury, Vasse, and Albany and an excellent attendance. Altogether the show was a most successful gathering in every way. The West Australian Saturday 31 December gave a large and full account of the exhibits which were good all round. The horse sections were well represented and special mention went to Mr. James Inglis' imported Clydesdale, bred in Victoria. Other winners in the horse classes were George Layman, M.L.C., John Allnutt, A. P. Turnball, Henry Doust, Joseph Mortimer, W. K. Adam and A. W. Moulton. Thomas Giblett and Thomas Muir were both credited with having a polled Angus bull, both fine animals, with the former carrying off first prize. "...it would be better if a few more of our settlers imported some real good new blood. The Angus breed, owing to their fine temper and beef carrying capabilities, are just the cattle wanted here." Others noted for fine cattle were, John Mottram, Thos. Giblett, Geo. Layman Jr., Mr. Moulton and Henry Doust. The exhibits, especially in the show of produce were most creditable, impressing the judges of this section, Messrs. D. A. Hay, G. R. Teede, and Thos. Muir. "The readers must imagine a table, sixty feet long with a hanging shelf over it, and these were both filled, besides a large number of splendid exhibits on the ground."

Through family research by John Maslin, official documents list Henry Doust as opening a Wayside Inn in 1878 and it was noted that the business went under a variety of names during the registering of the licensed business each year. Farmers Arms 1878, Farmers Rest 1879 and Farmers Home 1886 - 1890. A Book by Amelia McAlinden mentions a Mr Beadle (Beadell) as being the first owner, with Henry Doust purchasing the property when Mr Beadle returned to England. This was later verified in the 15 June 1901 edition of The Southern Times newspaper. The WA Government Gazette Records for 1880 showed there were two Publican General License holders in Bridgetown, that of Henry Doust of the 'Farmers Rest' and Thomas Ashbee

of the 'Emerald Isle Hotel.'

CLOSED: As previously notified the grounds are currently closed due to the occupation of the Australian Defence Force. As we have stated before, the grounds are a private venue, held in Trust by the Bridgetown Agricultural Society and its Councillors, a dedicated group of local volunteers. The grounds are used for public hire, event camping, the annual show and general recreation. Every improvement to the grounds is made through raising and carefully considering the use of the funds to affect those improvements. We encourage outdoor activities on the oval and do our best for the community and visitors who use the grounds, by maintaining the facilities and grounds as a user-friendly venue. It has come to the point where we can no longer tolerate the high incidence of irresponsible dog owners (who have been identified) and their Dog Poo (which they refuse to pick up in the bags provided and place in the bin provided). This is an ongoing issue for our groundskeepers and very unfair to those who hire the grounds. The actions of some are not acceptable and there are now consequences. The Showgrounds will be closed for October and November to the dog walking public to allow us to clean up and get rid of the dog poo before Marathon and Blues camping and show time. The grounds will then be reopened after show day.
